

Wake up to Trade Justice

Friday 15 - Saturday 16 April

Wake up to Trade Justice is the climax of the **Global Week of Action in the UK**. Join thousands of other campaigners for this unique overnight event!

It's your chance to stand in solidarity with people campaigning in over 80 countries across the world, and to challenge the UK government to deliver trade justice - not free trade.

Highlights include:

- 10pm** **Opening event at Westminster Abbey**
(doors open at 9pm) With celebrities, music and international speakers.
- 11pm** **Set off from Westminster Abbey**
Form a moving 'Human White Band' around Parliament Square.
- 11.30pm** **Lighting of candles on Whitehall**
(to sunrise) The start of the vigil.
- 12am** **One minute's silence**
- 4-4.30am** **Mass vigil on Whitehall**
Millions of people all over the world are suffering from unjust trade. Bring your candle and show your solidarity, at the time the greatest number of people in the world are awake.
- 6.30am** **Dawn procession**
Assemble on Tothill Street, next to Westminster Central Hall, for a final Trade Justice march.
- 8am** **Disperse**

Cafés

Methodist Central Hall, ground floor

Open all night. Run by The Women's Institute.

Café-in-the-Crypt

Open all night. Under St Martin's-in-the-Fields – selling soup, puddings, fairtrade tea and coffee.

Fairtrade Chill-Out Café

Open 12.15am until 6am. A space for students and young people at the Mothers' Union, Tufton Street.

What to bring

- A candle in a jam jar to light as part of the vigil, plus matches or a lighter.
- Be prepared for any weather. Bring plenty of warm clothes - and waterproofs, just in case.
- Refreshments will be available, but we suggest you bring your own food and drink as well.
- A torch to help form a moving 'Human White Band' around Parliament Square.
- Banners, balloons, placards or costumes for the dawn procession.
- Something to make a noise with in the dawn procession.
- When packing your bag, remember that you will be asked to keep your belongings with you at all times!

Safety information

- Stewards will be easily identifiable. They will be your best point of information during the night.
- Please make sure that you follow any instructions given by stewards. The event has been developed in full cooperation with the police to ensure that everyone has a peaceful, safe and happy night.
- First Aid points and toilets will be clearly signposted.
- Make sure you pick up the latest programme on the night for further event details and safety information.

Things to note

- Please tell a steward when you arrive if you have a disability that we need to know about.
- Please don't leave any litter, either in venues or on the streets. Friends of the Earth are providing a central recycling facility and will ensure that the event leaves no traces.

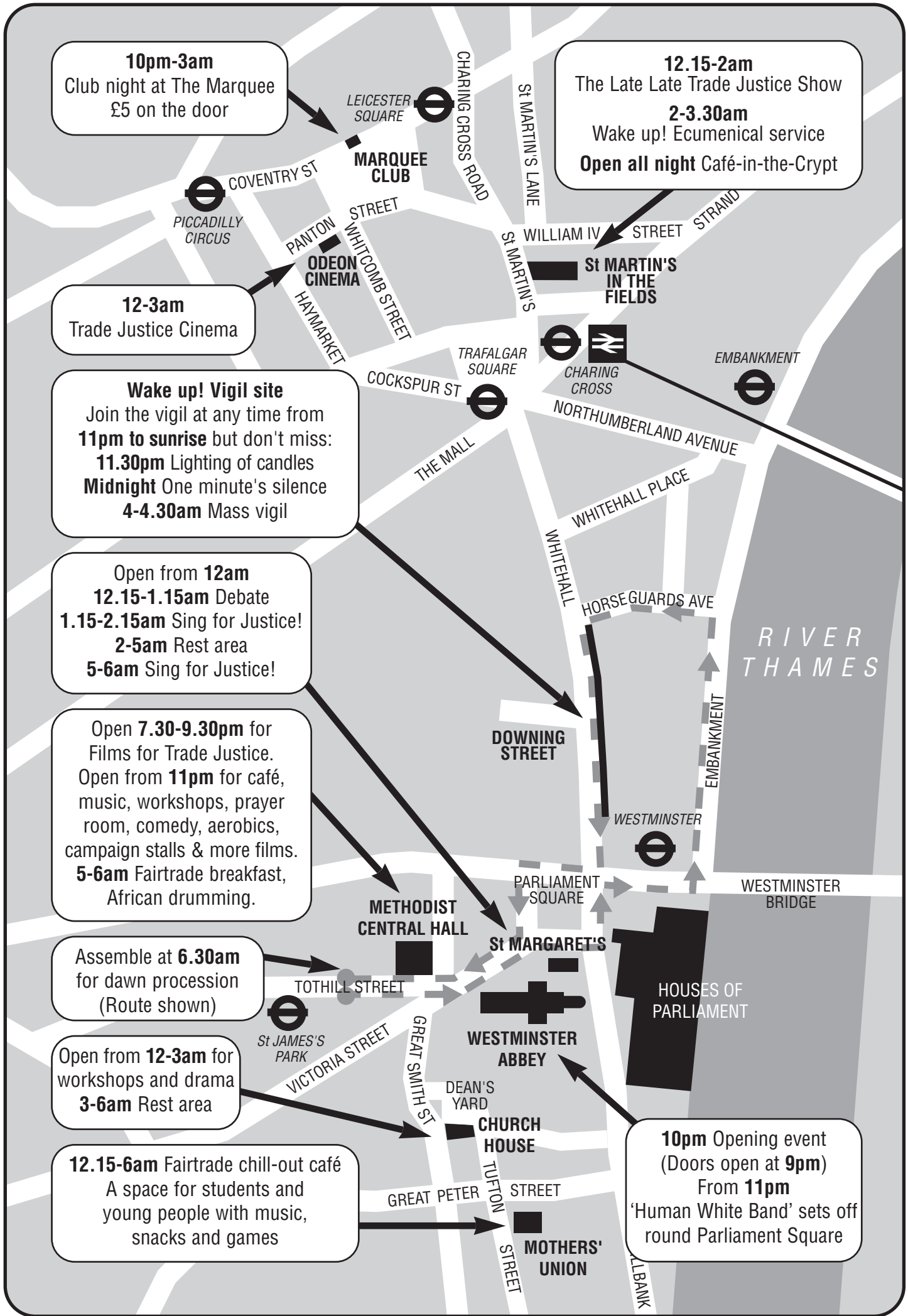
